Short Story 1: Harry By Rosemary Timperley

Setting and Background

This story is set in London, and for the most part, it takes place during summer, when the sun is shining and the roses are in full bloom. The atmosphere created by the story is one of eeriness and full of suspense.

Significance of the title

- A "Harry" can be a brother, imaginary friend, son, pet, anything, it is a simple word that can be seen in many ways.

Summary

- This story is unlike other ghost stories because it does not take place in the dead of night, rather it takes place in bright sunlight and this makes it more frightening.
- A little girl, Christine, makes an imaginary friend [Harry] on a hot beautiful summer day in their garden. The mother instinctively realizes that there is something just not quite right about this friendship, despite her husband and doctor telling her that her fears are unfounded.
- The mother decides to do her own research about Christine's background and discovers the tragic story of her adopted daughter's family. As she returns to pick up Christine from school, the teacher informs her that her brother Harry had already taken her home. Christine was never heard from again.

Characters


- Christine
 – nicknamed Chris
- -5 year old red-haired and blue-eyed girl
- -Makes friends with a ghost (or he with her) and becomes rather attached to him.
- -Real parents were dirt poor and she was born in a poor part of London
- -Is able to communicate with Harry, whose presence is a supernatural association. "Yes I am Christine, Oh, but they are my mummy and daddy".
- -She is very much devoted to Harry her brother. For e.g. "I hoped you would come because I like you, can Harry come too".

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- Mrs. James-is the narrator and Christine's adoptive mother
- -Treats and loves Chris as her own daughter. Kind, caring and very understanding person. For .e.g. "It's just I feel extra responsible for her". More so than if I were her real mother".
- -Is fearful of her daughter's friendship with Harry
- -Under so much pressure because of this odd relationship waking nightmares
- -Unable to freely voice her fears to her husband, so she decides to do her own investigation
- -Fearful for her daughter's safety and security.
- Jim
- -Christine's adoptive father, he loves his daughter
- -Type of person who believes that everything has a physical and rational explanation
- -Scoffs at his wife's fears
- Harry
- -When he was alive, he adored his baby sister
- -Saved her but tragically lost his own in the process
- -Always got his way, very determined when alive (and perhaps as a ghost too)
- -Red-haired tall 14 year old boy
- -As a ghost, he is Chris's constant companion and confidante
- -Loves Chris so much (seems obsessed) wants to take Chris home with him

Setting and Background

- She was overjoyed for Miranda Hull rather than being sad for Diane.

3. Miranda Hull (A Minor Character)

- Very little of her personality is known except for a few thing.

- She is probably very similar to the narrator.
