Lesson Notes:

Sentence Structures

- There are four types of sentences: simple, compound, complex and compound-complex.
- Each sentence is defined by the use of independent and dependent clauses, conjunctions and subordinators.
- A clause is one or more phrases linked to a verb that work tightly together.
- A conjunction is a word that is used to connect words, phrases and clauses.
- In a sentence there are connecting words called subordinators. Examples include, although, whereas, while...etc.

Examples of sentence structures:

- 1. Simple sentence (independent clause) Eg. I kicked the ball.
- 2. Compound sentence (two or more independent clauses) Eg. I kicked the ball and it hit Tom.
- 3. Complex sentence (one independent clause and one or more dependent clauses) Eg. Tom cried because the ball hit him.
- 4. Compound Complex sentence (two or more independent clauses and one or more dependent clauses)

Eg. Tom cried because the ball hit him and I apologized immediately.
