<u>LITERATURE – DRAMA – JULIUS CAESAR – BY WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE</u>

Act I, Scene 1: A street in Rome

The Mob Rebuked

Sequence of events

- The plebeians (common people) of Rome are celebrating Caesar's victory over the sons of his old enemy Pompey.
- An important function of this scene is to portray the nature of the Roman populace.
- Two tribunes, Flavius and Marullus, who are sympathizers of Pompey, angrily rebuke the crowd for taking a holiday.
- Marullus and Flavius remind the crowd of how they cheered for Pompey when he returned from victories over foreign enemies.
- The tribunes accuse the commoners of being heartless and ungrateful for showing enthusiasm and joy for someone who had murdered a fellow Roman.
- The people experience shame and guilt and leave quietly.
- Marullus and Flavius remove decorations from Caesar's statues in the public places.
- Flavius compares their actions to plucking feathers from Caesar's wing to prevent him from flying too high. (" these growing feathers plucked from Caesar's wing/ will make him fly an ordinary pitch)
